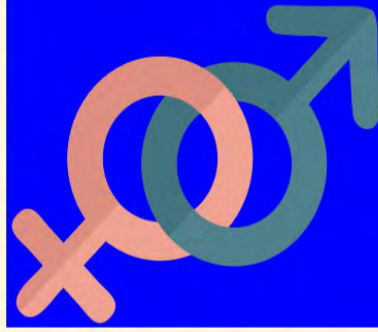

Karnataka Health Promotion Trust is implementing Samvedana Plus, with 800 female sex workers and their intimate partners, in partnership with a community based organisation of sex workers, Chaitanya AIDS Tadeгалтуwa Mahila Sangha in Karnataka, India. This programme runs from 2015 to 2017 with support from the United Nations Trust Fund to End Violence Against Women, What Works to Prevent Violence against Women and Girls consortium and the University of Manitoba, Canada. Within the DFID-funded STRIVE consortium, KHPT and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine are evaluating the impact of Samvedana Plus on violence and condom use in sex-workers' intimate relationships.
